
Broadening Student Horizons: Park's Reading Canon

As we continue to build the Park High reading canon, we are delighted to share that students will be receiving the first of our carefully selected novels next week ready for their tutor time shared reading. Please see below for further details.



Park High School Reading Canon

- Teachers can model fluency to help students become confident and happy readers:
- "In schools that have success with their pupils' reading, teachers read, talk with enthusiasm and recommend books, the results of which are seen not only in test results but also in an enthusiasm for reading which extends beyond the classroom" (Excellence in English Ofsted)
- · Help show correct pronunciation of unfamiliar vocabulary
- · Can ensure enjoyment together slowing the pace and enjoying reading
- · Guide students through more challenging texts
- Exposure to more sophisticated vocabulary adding to word repertoire will help in LIFE!
- Enriching our students
- Challenge students out of their comfort zones and help them enjoy a greater variety of text type
- Reading outside of subject lessons frees us from the restraint of content coverage / mark schemes and practice questions and fosters a love of reading – lets enjoy together
- We can enjoy being read to just like primary school and our early childhood days



Our weekly shared reading now moves from short stories to fiction novels.

We have:

- Carefully selected novels to really engage students
- Selected to allow discussion of sensitive issues in a controlled, teacher led environment. We want to help students to address themes such as diversity, inequality, social deprivation and current affairs.
- Chosen novels to increase understanding and exposure to a range of historical, social, cultural and political aspects of the world – building on cultural capital and the ability to navigate the world we live in successfully.
- Found stories to provoke discussion and debate and improve oral confidence. As students progress through school life, we aim to develop confidence in their oral contributions, opinions and ability to understand the views of others.
- Aimed to to stretch students and expose them to tier 2 vocabulary to build their word repertoire. Tier 2 words are often not met in spoken language. These words won't all be remembered by students but they will have the opportunity to hear them in context and consider other contexts.
- Chosen novels that are age appropriate for our students enabling stretch, challenge, but most importantly enjoyment!

Homelessness is not uncommon and the stary promotes underlying messages about not being judgemental, the redemptive power of kindness and the need to understand differing people's needs and circumstances."




Selected Novel: House Pegasus


"A story based around a family who get on the wrong side of the Nigerian authorities
